



The Great Fire of London



Phase: Year 1/2	Term: Autumn 2	Duration: 3 weeks
Learning Button Focus: Reflector		
<p>Rationale: We will be amazed to discover a mystery box of items has been delivered to us; our challenge will be to uncover the connections between the items in the box and to deduce which historical event they are all linked to. Once we have found out that they are all related to the Great Fire of London, we will find out about the timeline of events and then write our own recount ready to share with Year 3/4 at our outcome. We will then find out about the firefighting methods of the time, explore why the fire spread so quickly and share eye witness accounts to find out more information. After that we will use the drama techniques 'freeze framing' and 'thought tapping' to explore different role-play scenarios surrounding the fire to develop a deeper understanding of the thoughts and feelings of the people involved. Finally we will think about how London has changed as a result of the fire; all this learning this will help us write an information book for our school library. Our topic will culminate in a showcase of the children's learning including a retelling, songs and sharing information books in small groups with Year 3 / 4.</p>
